

2023 REVIEW AND OUTLOOK

Equity markets finished the year on a positive note with December returns for the TSX Composite, S&P 500 and NASDAQ of 3.9%, 4.5% and 5.6%, respectively. Bond yields continued their descent from late October highs with 10-year government bond yields finishing the year at 3.11% and 3.88% in Canada and the United States. The move lower in rates fueled a Santa Claus rally that propelled the S&P 500 to within 1% of its all-time high. Notably, the S&P 500 total return index, which includes dividends, hit seven new highs in 2023.

While it is always a positive sign to see markets reaching new heights, we are especially encouraged by the recent broad-based participation from companies and sectors that have lagged throughout the year. It is widely known that the “Magnificent Seven” stocks have been the market leaders for the majority of 2023 while many other sectors and strategies have been left behind. This notable dispersion in returns has finally started to reverse during the final two months of the year.

Dividend stocks faced increased competition throughout 2023 from income alternatives, such as GICs and HISAs. In the U.S., a record \$1.3 trillion of inflows went into money market funds as investors flocked to high-yielding short-term instruments. Now, with bond yields having fallen more than 1% in two months and interest rate cuts expected to begin in a few months, dividend paying equities are coming back into favour. For example, Canadian REITs have an average dividend yield of 5.3% which exceeds the yield of Canadian 5-year government bonds by more than 200 basis points and makes their dividends more attractive on a relative basis. We expect at least a portion of the capital that flowed into money market funds to make their way back into equities this year, with dividend payers particularly well-positioned to benefit from such a rotation.

Middlefield Real Estate Dividend Class delivered another year of attractive returns compared to the benchmark, outperforming S&P/TSX Capped REIT Total Return by almost 590 bps with 8.5% return in 2023. REITs continued to rally in December, generating a total return of 9% in Canada and 8.7% in the U.S. The sector's impressive performance during the final two months of the year resulted in full-year total returns of 7.1% in Canada and 12.3% in the U.S. Improving macro conditions and a solid fundamental backdrop within real estate underpin our positive outlook for publicly-listed REITs in 2024. The recent rally coincides with U.S. 10-year Treasury yields falling from 5% to 3.9% and growing expectations for monetary policy easing from central banks in 2024. Although share prices have bounced back in recent months, current valuations support additional upside. On average, the Canadian real estate sector trades at just 13x 2024 AFFO, a 7.2% implied cap rate and 24% below net asset value.

Middlefield Innovation Dividend Class is designed to replication the performance of *Middlefield Innovation Dividend ETF* where we see a wealth of long-term opportunities in companies with established business models, attractive free cash flow profiles and reasonable valuation. The fund generated a total return of 42.8% in 2023, exceeding the NASDAQ Technology Dividend TR Index return of 34.5%. The outperformance was primarily influenced by the fund's overweighting in growth-oriented technology securities. It was an exceptional year for big tech stocks, reflected by the NASDAQ 100 generating a total return of 55.1%. The Magnificent 7 stocks led the market for most of the year, with NVIDIA and Meta generating standout returns of 238.9% and 194.1%, respectively. *Middlefield U.S. Dividend Growers Class* and *Middlefield Global Dividend Growers Class* also outperformed their benchmark by wide margins (*U.S. Dividend Growers Class*' 20.6% vs. S&P 500 Dividend Aristocrats Net Total Return Index's 5.1% and *Global Dividend Growers Class*' 17.4% vs. MSCI World Dividend Growers Quality Select Index Net USD's 8.4%) thanks to their strategically overweighting in outperforming sectors, including Technology.

The Middlefield Family of mutual funds, which are listed at the end of this report, currently includes nine different funds within the multi-class structure and three mutual fund trusts. The multi-class structure of Middlefield Mutual Funds enables investors to benefit from superior tax efficiencies unavailable to other forms of investment funds. In addition, almost all classes are offered in F-Series.

Although current market conditions should be conducive to multiple expansion in 2024, we are primarily focused on earnings growth within the tech sector. While we believe the SMID-cap tech trade has room to run, we are cautious on high growth tech due to elevated valuations and thus, high execution risk. We prefer to stick to high-quality names and are increasingly mindful of valuations after last year's performance. As a result, we remain focused primarily on large cap stocks and continue to invest in companies with a proven track record. We are continuing to find opportunities within several end-markets such as PCs and smartphones, but an even greater growth driver may come from the proliferation of AI in the economy.

Middlefield Global Energy Transition Class seeks to maximize long-term total return through investment in dividend-paying securities of global companies engaged in the transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy sources. Thanks to the fund's underweighting of clean technology companies focused on solar, wind and hydrogen versus the index, despite the industry faced many headwinds during 2023 including inflation, disruption in supply chains, and regulatory pressures, it outperformed S&P Global Clean Energy Net TR's -22.3% return in 2023 by 24.1%, delivering a 1.8% return for the full year. *Middlefield Global Infrastructure Fund* delivered a return of 2.1% in 2023. The fund was affected by its allocation to the sustainable subset of infrastructure issuers, which underperformed the broader infrastructure sector. 2023 was an extremely challenging year for the clean power industry. Offshore wind was the most acutely impacted by macro headwinds which included cost inflation, higher financing expenses, project delays, cancellations, and hedging issues. While challenges still exist, the backdrop has improved in recent months and we remind investors that the energy transition is a multi-decade investment theme. Despite stock price declines in 2023, several countries and businesses continue to invest in the energy transition, with 118 nations pledging to triple the global renewable energy capacity by 2030, as announced at the COP28 conference. With inflation showing signs of cooling and negative sentiment already factored in, many clean power stocks could be poised for a sustained recovery in 2024.

Middlefield Healthcare Dividend Fund generated a total return of 0.7%. Although healthcare finished the year with a total return of 1.3%, 2023 marked the sector's most significant underperformance relative to the S&P 500 in 30 years. Profit growth impacted healthcare stocks as year-over-year earnings comparisons were challenging after a year of pandemic-related tailwinds in 2022. The Biden Administration officially ended the COVID-19 national emergency in April 2023 which contributed to reduced spending on COVID vaccines, therapeutics and testing equipment.

Outlook

Our outlook for the economy in 2024 is for a soft landing. We are not predicting a recession this year, but rather a deceleration from the high growth experienced in 2023 (such as 5.2% U.S. GDP growth in Q3). This gives us optimism for equity markets for three key factors. First, inflation should continue to trend lower, particularly as the shelter component of inflation calculations roll over. Second, we expect the approaching wave of monetary policy easing to support stocks. The futures market is currently projecting approximately five rate cuts from both the Bank of Canada and the Fed in 2024. Finally, we expect earnings to return to growth mode in 2024 after being relatively flat in 2023. Consensus expectations are for S&P 500 EPS growth of 10% in 2024 and 11.2% into 2025.

Although we hold a positive outlook for the year ahead, it is important to acknowledge that after nine consecutive weeks of positive returns for the S&P 500 (its longest winning streak since 2004), markets are starting the year with overbought conditions. We would not be surprised to see a near-term market pullback at the beginning of the year which should be viewed as a healthy correction within a broader bull trend. Going back to 1950, the market has generated a positive return 80% of the time following a year where the S&P 500 returned over 20%. In an economy characterized by falling inflation, historically low unemployment and solid consumer spending, it is likely that new highs are on the horizon.

ANNUAL MANAGEMENT REPORT OF FUND PERFORMANCE

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2023

Management's Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Middlefield Income Plus Class (the "Fund") is a mutual fund class of Middlefield Mutual Funds Limited. The Fund is authorized to issue series of shares designated as Series A and F. The Fund's objective is to provide a stable level of income while emphasizing capital preservation. The Fund invests in a diversified portfolio of equity and fixed income securities.

Risk

The Fund is exposed to several risks that may affect its performance. The overall risk of the Fund is as described in its prospectus dated June 7, 2023. During the past year, the overall risk level of the Fund may have been impacted as follows:

Market Risk

Market risk describes the Fund's exposure to volatility in the market value of its underlying securities. Equity markets continue to exhibit volatility due to an uncertain interest rate environment; the increased competition that equity investments are facing from income alternatives, such as GICs and High Interest Savings Accounts ("HISAs"); and the risk that the economy enters a recession.

Results of Operations

Investment Performance

The net assets of the Fund increased from \$118.5 million at December 31, 2022 to \$141.9 million at December 31, 2023. Net assets on a per share basis for Series A decreased from \$15.93 at December 31, 2022 to \$15.91 at December 31, 2023. Net assets on a per share basis for Series F increased from \$19.01 at December 31, 2022 to \$19.38 at December 31, 2023. The Fund recorded a \$4.4 million net gain on its investment portfolio during the year ended December 31, 2023.

Revenue and Expenses

Revenue for the year ended December 31, 2023 amounted to \$9.8 million, up from revenue of \$1.7 million in 2022. The increase was primarily due to the net gain on the Fund's investments. Operating expenses for the year ended December 31, 2023 amounted to \$2.4 million, up from \$2.0 million in 2022. The management expense ratio ("MER") in 2023 was 2.07% for Series A and 0.95% for Series F. Distributions for the year ended

December 31, 2023 amounted to \$0.90 per share for both Series A and Series F.

Related Party Transactions

Pursuant to a management agreement, Middlefield Limited (the "Manager") receives a management fee. For further details please see the "Management Fees" section of this report. Middlefield Capital Corporation ("MCC" or the "Advisor"), the advisor to the Fund and a company under common control with the Manager, receives advisory fees from the Manager out of the management fee. MCC also receives brokerage commissions from the Fund in connection with securities transactions. All brokerage commissions paid by the Fund to MCC were at or below market rates. As at December 31, 2023, the Fund held investments in other investment funds managed by the Manager. All management fees charged by the underlying investment fund held by the Fund were rebated to the Fund. For further details please see the notes to the financial statements.

Management Fees

Management fees are calculated at 1.5% per annum for the Series A shares and 0.5% per annum for the Series F shares, of the net asset value of each Series and are split between the Manager, the Advisor and investment dealers who receive trailing commissions. The Manager receives fees for the general administration of the Fund, including maintaining the accounting records, executing securities trades, monitoring compliance with regulatory requirements, and negotiating contractual agreements, among other things. The Advisor receives fees from the Manager for providing investment advice in respect of the portfolio in accordance with the investment objective and strategies of the Fund. During the year ended December 31, 2023, approximately 40.8% of total management fees were used to pay for trailing commissions.

Recent Developments

On January 24, 2024, Discovery 2022 Short Duration LP transferred net assets to the Fund with a fair value amount of \$10.1 million in exchange for 0.6 million shares of the Fund. Under the *Income Tax Act* (Canada) (the "Tax Act"), the Fund is deemed to have acquired each flow-through asset of the partnership at an ACB equal to its cost amount to the partnership. The Tax Act deems the ACB of the assets that are flow-through shares to be \$nil.

On February 15, 2024, MRF 2022 Resource LP transferred net assets to the Fund with a fair value amount of \$10.7 million in exchange for 0.6 million shares of the Fund. Under the Tax Act, the Fund is deemed to have acquired each flow-through asset of the partnership at an ACB equal to its cost amount to the partnership. The Tax Act deems the ACB of the assets that are flow-through shares to be \$nil.

A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher the Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.






1. Middlefield Income Plus Class

Middlefield Income Plus Class (the "Fund") is one of nine classes of issued mutual fund shares of Middlefield Mutual Funds Limited (the "Corporation"), a mutual fund corporation continued under the laws of Alberta. Effective January 1, 2017, switches between classes of a mutual fund corporation are considered a disposition at fair market value for tax purposes, resulting in the recognition of capital gains or losses for investors. The changes have not affected switches between Series A and Series F securities of the same Mutual Fund class. The Fund is authorized to issue series of shares designated as Series A and F. Each series has a different management fee rate. The Fund first issued Series A shares on September 21, 2000 and Series F shares on June 21, 2011. The investment objective of the Fund is to provide a stable level of income while emphasizing capital preservation by investing in a diversified portfolio of equity and fixed income securities. Middlefield Limited is the manager of the Fund (the "Manager"). The address of the Fund's registered office is 350 7 Ave SW Suite 3400, Calgary, Alberta. These financial statements, expressed in Canadian Dollars, were authorized for issuance by the board of directors of the Fund on March 22, 2024.

On January 24, 2023, Discovery 2021 Short Duration LP transferred net assets to the Fund with a fair value amount of \$14.9 million in exchange for 0.9 million shares of the Fund. Under the *Income Tax Act* (Canada) (the "Tax Act"), the Fund is deemed to have acquired each flow-through asset of the partnership at an ACB equal to its cost amount to the partnership. The Tax Act deems the ACB of the assets that are flow-through shares to be \$nil.

On February 15, 2023, MRF 2021 Resource LP transferred net assets to the Fund with a fair value amount of \$13.2 million in exchange for 0.8 million shares of the Fund. Under the Tax Act, the Fund is deemed to have acquired each flow-through asset of the partnership at an ACB equal to its cost amount to the partnership. The Tax Act deems the ACB of the assets that are flow-through shares to be \$nil.

2. Basis of Presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") as published by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB") and as required by Canadian securities legislation and the Canadian Accounting Standards Board.

3. Summary of Material Accounting Policies

A. Basis of Accounting

IFRS 9 *Financial Instruments* ("IFRS9")

The Fund classifies and measures financial instruments in accordance with IFRS 9, which requires assets to be carried at amortized cost or fair value, with changes in fair value recognized in profit and loss or other comprehensive income, based on the entity's business model for managing financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The Fund's financial assets and liabilities are classified at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL") and amortized cost.

Classification, Measurement, Impairment and Hedge Accounting

The Fund classifies its investments in debt and equity securities based on its business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. These financial assets are managed and their performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund also manages these financial assets with the objective of realizing cash flows through sales. Further, an option to irrevocably designate any equity securities at fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVOCI") has not been taken. Consequently, these financial assets are mandatorily measured at FVTPL.

Financial assets or financial liabilities held for trading are those acquired principally for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near future or on initial recognition they are a part of a portfolio of identified financial instruments that the Fund manages together and has a recent actual pattern of short term profit taking. All derivatives and short positions are included in this category and mandatorily measured at FVTPL. The financial assets and liabilities measured at amortized cost include cash collateral posted on derivative positions, accrued income, due to and from brokers and other short term receivables and payables.

IFRS 9 uses the expected credit loss model ("ECL"), as the new impairment model for financial assets carried at amortized cost. The Fund's financial assets measured at amortized cost consist of trade receivables with no financing component and which have maturities of less than 12 months, as such, it has chosen to apply the simplified ECL approach, whereby any loss allowance is recognized based on the lifetime of ECLs. Due to the high quality and short-term nature of the trade receivables, there are no expected credit losses associated with them and they are not considered impaired at the reporting dates.

The Fund does not apply general hedge accounting to any of its derivatives positions.

B. Financial Instruments

The Fund's financial instruments may include: short-term investments, fixed income, equities, structured products including investment funds managed by the Manager, derivatives (collectively referred to as "investments"), cash, accounts receivable-portfolio securities sold, income and interest receivable, accounts receivable, subscriptions receivable, prepaid expenses, accounts payable-portfolio securities purchased, management fee payable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, redemptions payable and distributions payable. The Fund recognizes financial instruments at fair value upon initial recognition, plus transaction costs in the case of financial instruments measured at amortized cost. Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognized at their trade date. The Fund's investments and derivative assets and liabilities are measured at fair value. The Fund's Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares are measured at fair value. All other financial assets and liabilities are measured at amortized cost. Under this method, financial assets and liabilities reflect the amount required to be received or paid, discounted, when appropriate, at the contract's effective interest rate. The Fund's accounting policies for measuring the fair value of its investments and derivatives are identical to those used in measuring its net asset value ("NAV") for transactions with shareholders.

The Fund only offsets financial assets and financial liabilities if the Fund has a legally enforceable right to offset recognized amounts and either intends to settle on a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

C. Redeemable Shares and Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares

The Fund has two series of redeemable shares in issue: Series A and Series F. Both rank *pari passu* in all material respects and have the same terms and conditions other than the management fee rate, which is 1.5% for Series A and 0.5% for Series F.

Redeemable shares can be put back to the Fund at any time for cash equal to a proportionate share of the Fund's NAV attributable to the share class. The redeemable shares are classified as financial liabilities and are measured at the redemption amounts.

Redeemable shares are issued and redeemed based on the Fund's NAV per share, calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund, calculated in accordance with the Fund's Simplified Prospectus, by the number of redeemable shares in issue. The Fund's Simplified Prospectus requires that investment positions are valued on the basis of the last traded market price for the purpose of determining the trading NAV per share for subscriptions and redemptions.

The financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss in the Statements of Financial Position are based on closing prices in accordance with IFRS.

Distributions are declared at the discretion of the board of directors of the Corporation. The board of directors has adopted a policy of annually assessing the Corporation's net income and net realized capital gains and declaring distributions including, if applicable, capital gains dividends to refund tax which would otherwise be payable by the Corporation. Distributions to holders of redeemable shares are recognized in the Statements of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares. Income not distributed is included in Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares.

Net assets are calculated for each series of shares of the Fund. The net assets of a particular series of shares is computed by calculating the value of the series' proportionate share of the assets and liabilities of the Fund common to all series. Management fees directly attributable to a series are charged to that series. Other expenses, investment income and realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments are allocated proportionately to each series based upon the relative net assets of each series.

D. Fair Value Measurement

The Fund's own credit risk and the credit risk of the counterparty are taken into account in determining the fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities, including derivative instruments. Investments and futures contracts are valued at fair value using the policies described below.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value of financial assets and liabilities traded in active markets are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the reporting date. The Fund uses the last traded market price for both financial assets and financial liabilities where the last traded price falls within that day's bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the last traded price is not within the bid-ask spread, the Manager determines the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of fair value based on the specific facts and circumstances.

Futures contracts are marked to market each valuation day according to the gain or loss that would have been realized if the contracts had been closed out. Gains or losses arising from futures contracts are recorded as unrealized gain (loss) on futures contracts and shown as an asset (liability) on the Statements of Financial Position until the contracts are closed out or expire, at which time the gains (losses) are realized. The Fund may use derivatives, such as forward currency contracts, to hedge against losses caused by changes in exchange rates. The value of forward currency contracts is the gain or loss that would be realized, if on the valuation date, the positions were to be closed out. The change in value of forward currency contracts is included in the Statements of Comprehensive Income. Realized gains and losses from derivative instruments that are specific economic hedges are accounted for in the same manner as the underlying investments being hedged and are included in the Statements of Comprehensive Income.

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market (for example, over-the-counter derivatives) is determined by using valuation techniques. The Fund uses a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each reporting date. Valuation techniques used include the use of comparable recent arm's length transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, option pricing models and other valuation techniques commonly used by market participants making the maximum use of market inputs and relying as little as possible on entity specific inputs.

E. Investment Transactions and Income Recognition

Investment transactions are accounted for as of the trade date and any realized gains or losses from such transactions are calculated on an average cost basis. Average cost does not include amortization of premiums or discounts on fixed income securities with the exception of zero coupon bonds. The change in the difference between fair value and average cost of the investments is recorded as an unrealized gain (loss) on investments. Income from investments is recognized on the ex-dividend or ex-distribution date. Interest income for distribution purposes shown on the Statements of Comprehensive Income represents the interest received on bank deposits by the Fund and, if the Fund holds fixed income investments, coupon interest accounted for on an accrual basis. The Fund does not amortize premiums paid or discounts received on the purchase of fixed income securities except for zero coupon bonds which are amortized on a straight line basis. The interest income for distribution purposes is the tax basis of calculating the interest received and which is subject to tax. Income distributions received are treated consistently with dividends and interest and recorded in income in the Statements of Comprehensive Income.

F. Increase (Decrease) in Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares Per Share

Increase (Decrease) in Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares per share in the Statements of Comprehensive Income represents the increase (decrease) in Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares for each series divided by the average shares outstanding for each series during the year.

G. Income Taxes

The Corporation qualifies as a mutual fund corporation as defined in the *Income Tax Act* (Canada) (the "Tax Act"). The Corporation is subject to tax at the full corporate rate on its taxable income. Dividends received from taxable Canadian corporations are generally not included in the taxable income of the Corporation but are subject to a special tax, refunded at a rate of 38 1/3% of taxable dividends distributed by the Corporation to its shareholders. Capital gains realized in the year are included in the taxable income of the Fund at the applicable capital gains rate. The Corporation is eligible for a refund calculated on a formula basis when mutual fund shares are redeemed or when capital gains dividends are paid to shareholders. The Corporation endeavours to pay out sufficient Canadian dividends and net capital gains so that it will not be subject to refundable income taxes in respect of income from those sources. However, the Corporation will be liable for non-refundable income tax if its income from other sources exceeds its expenses for the year.

Temporary differences between the carrying values of assets and liabilities for accounting and income tax purposes give rise to future income tax assets and liabilities. The most significant temporary difference is that between the reported fair value of the investment portfolio and its adjusted cost base ("ACB") for income tax purposes. To the extent that the fair value of the portfolio exceeds its ACB, a future tax liability arises. Since capital gains taxes payable by the Corporation are refundable under the relevant provisions of the Tax Act, the future tax liability is fully offset by these future refundable taxes. Conversely, when the ACB exceeds the fair value of the portfolio, a future tax asset is generated. In such cases, a full valuation allowance is taken to offset this asset given the uncertainty that such future tax assets will ultimately be realized.

The Fund currently incurs withholding taxes imposed by certain countries on investment income and capital gains. Such income and gains are recorded on a gross basis and the related withholding taxes are shown separately in the Statements of Comprehensive Income.

Distributions received from investments in trust units that are treated as a return of capital for tax purposes are used to reduce the average cost of the underlying investments on the Schedule of Investment Portfolio.

H. Foreign Currency Translation

Foreign currency amounts are translated into Canadian dollars as follows: fair value of investments, forward currency contracts and other assets and liabilities, at the closing rate of exchange on each business day; income and expenses, and purchases, sales and settlements of investments, at the rate of exchange prevailing on the respective dates of such transactions.

I. Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of financial statements requires management to use judgment in applying its accounting policies and to make estimates and assumptions about the future. The following discusses the most significant accounting judgments and estimates that the Fund has made in preparing the financial statements:

Determination of Functional Currency

'Functional currency' is the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates. If indicators of the primary economic environment are mixed, then management uses its judgment to determine the functional currency that most faithfully represents the economic effect of the underlying transactions, events, and conditions. The majority of the Fund's investments and transactions are denominated in Canadian dollars. Investor subscriptions and redemptions are also received and paid in Canadian dollars. Accordingly, management has determined that the functional currency of the Fund is Canadian dollars.

Fair Value Measurement of Derivatives and Securities Not Quoted in an Active Market

The Fund may hold financial instruments that are not quoted in active markets, including derivatives. Fair values of such instruments are determined using valuation techniques and may be determined using reputable pricing sources (such as pricing agencies) or indicative prices from market makers. Broker quotes as obtained from the pricing sources may be indicative and not executable or binding. Where no market data is available, the Fund may value positions using its own models, which are usually based on valuation methods and techniques generally recognized as standard within the industry. The models used to determine fair values are validated and periodically reviewed by experienced personnel of the Manager, independent of the party that created them. The models used for private equity securities are based mainly on earnings multiples adjusted for a lack of marketability as appropriate.

Models use observable data, to the extent practicable. However, areas such as credit risk (both own and counterparty), volatilities and correlations require the Manager to make estimates. Changes in assumptions about these factors could affect the reported fair values of financial instruments. The Fund considers observable data to be market data that is readily available, regularly distributed and updated, reliable and verifiable, not proprietary, and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market. Refer to Note 4 for further information about the fair value measurement of the Fund's financial instruments.

4. Fair Value Disclosure

The Fund classifies fair value measurements within a hierarchy which gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

All fair value measurements above are recurring. The carrying values of cash, income and interest receivable, subscriptions receivable, prepaid expenses, redemptions payable, management fee payable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, and the Fund's obligation for Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares approximates their fair values due to their short-term nature.

Fair values are classified as Level 1 when the related security is actively traded and a quoted price is available. If an instrument classified as Level 1 subsequently ceases to be actively traded, it is transferred out of Level 1. In such cases, instruments are reclassified into Level 2, unless the measurement of its fair value requires the use of significant unobservable inputs, in which case it is classified as Level 3.

Equities

The Fund's equity positions, which include investments in other investment funds managed by the Manager, are classified as Level 1 when the security is actively traded and a reliable price is observable. Certain of the Fund's equities and warrants do not trade frequently and therefore observable prices may not be available. In such cases, fair value is determined using observable market data (e.g. transactions for similar securities of the same issuer) and the fair value is classified as Level 2, unless the determination of fair value requires significant unobservable data, in which case the measurement is classified as Level 3.

Debt Securities

Debt securities include primarily government or corporate bonds and are classified as Level 1 when the securities are actively traded. Securities which are valued using models with inputs including interest rate curves, credit spreads and volatilities are generally observable and therefore these securities are classified as Level 2.

The Fund applies judgment in determining unobservable inputs to calculate the fair value of Level 3 financial instruments. As at December 31, 2023, the Fund held \$3,737,352 (December 31, 2022 – \$3,697,637) of Level 3 securities. The unobservable inputs used in the valuation of these financial instruments primarily include key variables, current market conditions and recent financings by the issuer, if any. These securities are affected by market activity in their relevant sectors and therefore generally fluctuate similarly. The Fund's level 3 investment Brookfield Super-Core Infrastructure Partners LP represents 2.7% of the Fund's investment portfolio and measured at the NAV of Brookfield Super-Core Infrastructure Partners LP as at December 31, 2023, Brookfield Super-Core Infrastructure Partners LP primarily holds level 3 investments and the inputs to the NAV require significant management judgement or estimation.

The Fund's policy is to recognize transfers in and out of the fair value hierarchy levels as at the end of the reporting year for transfers between Levels 1 and 2 and as at the date of the transfer for transfers in and out of Level 3. No transfers between levels occurred during the years ended December 31, 2023 or 2022.

The use of reasonable possible alternative assumptions for valuing Level 3 financial instruments would not significantly affect the fair value of these instruments.

5. Financial Risk Management

In the normal course of business the Fund is exposed to a variety of financial risks: price risk, interest rate risk, liquidity risk, foreign exchange rate risk, credit risk and concentration risk. The Fund's primary risk management objective is to protect earnings and cash flow and, ultimately, shareholder value. Risk management strategies, as discussed below, are designed and implemented to ensure the Fund's risks and related exposures are consistent with its objectives and risk tolerance.

Most of the Fund's risks are derived from its investments. The value of the investments within the Fund's portfolio can fluctuate on a daily basis as a result of changes in interest rates, economic conditions, commodity prices, the market and company news related to specific securities held by the Fund. The investments are made in accordance with the Fund's risk management policies. The policies establish investment objectives, strategies, criteria and restrictions. The objectives of these policies are to identify and mitigate investment risk through a disciplined investment process and the appropriate structuring of each transaction.

A. Price Risk

Price risk is the risk that changes in the prices of the Fund's investments will affect the Fund's income or the value of its financial instruments. The Fund's price risk is driven primarily by volatility in commodity and equity prices. Rising commodity and equity prices may increase the price of an investment while declining commodity and equity prices may have the opposite effect. The Fund mitigates price risk by making investing decisions based upon various factors, including comprehensive fundamental analysis prepared by industry experts to forecast future commodity and equity price movements. The Fund's market positions are monitored on a daily basis by the portfolio manager and regular financial reviews of publicly available information related to the Fund's investments are performed to ensure that any risks are within established levels of risk tolerance. The Fund is exposed to price risk through the following financial instrument:

Based on the above exposure at December 31, 2023, a 10% increase or decrease in the prices of the Fund's investments would result in a \$14,010,975 (December 31, 2022 – \$9,717,904) increase or decrease in net assets of the Fund, with all other factors held constant.

B. Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk describes the Fund's exposure to changes in the general level of interest rates. Interest rate risk arises when the Fund invests in interest-bearing financial assets such as cash and debt securities. The earnings of the Fund are positively correlated to interest rates as they relate to interest on cash balances. Rising interest rates serve to increase the Fund's earnings while the reverse is true in a declining interest rate environment. The Fund is also exposed to the risk that the value of financial assets such as corporate and government debt will fluctuate due to changes in the prevailing levels of market interest rates. The value of such financial assets is negatively correlated to interest rates. The Fund seeks to mitigate this risk through active management, which involves analysis of economic indicators to forecast Canadian and global interest rates. The tables below summarize the Fund's exposure to interest rate risk by remaining term to maturity:

Based on the above exposure at December 31, 2023, a 1% per annum increase or decrease in interest rates would result in a \$16,650 (December 31, 2022 – \$560,662 decrease or increase) increase or decrease in net assets of the Fund, with all other factors held constant.

C. Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is defined as the risk that the Fund may not be able to settle or meet its obligations when due. The Fund is exposed to daily cash redemptions of its shares. The shares of the Fund are issued and redeemed on demand at the NAV per share. All other obligations of the Fund are due within one year. Liquidity risk is managed by investing the majority of the Fund's assets in investments that are traded in an active market and can be readily sold. The Fund retains sufficient cash to maintain liquidity and comply with liquidity requirements as outlined by securities legislation and its investment policies.

The Fund may invest in securities that are not traded on a public stock exchange or that may be illiquid. As a result, the Fund may not be able to dispose of these investments in a timely manner. The Fund mitigates this risk through active management, which involves detailed analysis of such private entities to ensure they are financially sound and would be attractive to potential investors if a sale is necessary. The Fund's investment policies and securities legislation limit the amount invested in illiquid securities and these limits are monitored. As at December 31, 2023, the Fund held illiquid securities fair valued at \$3,737,352 (December 31, 2022 - \$3,697,637).

D. Foreign Exchange Rate Risk

Foreign exchange rate risk describes the impact on the underlying value of financial instruments due to foreign exchange rate movements. The Canadian dollar is the Fund's functional and presentation currency. Foreign investments, commodities, receivables and payables denominated in foreign currencies are affected by changes in the value of the Canadian dollar compared to foreign currencies. As a result, financial assets may depreciate/appreciate in the short-term due to the strengthening/weakening of the Canadian dollar against other currencies, and the reverse would be true for financial liabilities. The Fund's exposure to foreign exchange risk relates primarily to its investment in securities, which are denominated in U.S. dollars. The Fund has not hedged its exposure to currency fluctuations, however, it closely monitors relevant foreign exchange currency movements. Based on the above exposure at December 31, 2023, a 10% increase or decrease in the Canadian dollar against the respective currencies would result in a \$ 6,367,089 (December 31, 2022 - \$4,454,575) decrease or increase in net assets of the Fund, with all other factors held constant.

E. Credit Risk

Credit risk represents the financial loss that the Fund would experience if a counterparty to a financial instrument failed to meet its obligations to the Fund. The Fund is exposed to credit risk on its debt instruments, derivative assets, cash and cash equivalents and other short term trade receivables. The Fund measures credit risk and lifetime ECLs related to the trade receivables using historical analysis and forward looking information in determining the ECL. The carrying amounts of financial assets represent the maximum credit exposure. All transactions executed by the Fund in listed securities are settled upon delivery using approved brokers. The risk of default is considered minimal, as delivery of securities sold is only made once the broker has received payment. Payment is made on a purchase only once the broker has received the securities. The trade will fail if either party fails to meet its obligations. There is no significant credit risk related to the Fund's receivables.

The Fund's credit risk is primarily attributable to its investment in debt instruments because the issuer of the instrument may be unable to make interest payments or repay the principal amount on maturity. The concentration of credit risk of investments in debt instruments is minimal since the Fund invests in a variety of debt instruments issued by numerous issuers.

The Fund has established various internal controls to help mitigate credit risk, including prior approval of all investments by the advisor whose mandate includes conducting financial and other assessments of these investments on a regular basis. The Fund has also implemented policies which ensure that investments can only be made with counterparties that have a minimum acceptable credit rating.

These numbers were used to calculate the respective Increase (Decrease) in Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares per share.

7. Related Party Transactions

A. Management Fee

The Manager provides investment and administrative services to the Fund. In consideration for such services the Manager receives a monthly fee in arrears based on each series of shares as a percentage of the average daily NAV of the series. The management fee for Series A is 1.5% per annum and for Series F is 0.5% per annum. For the year ended December 31, 2023, management fees before the absorption of expenses amounted to \$1.6 million (December 31, 2022 - \$1.4 million).

B. Transaction Costs

Brokerage commissions and other transaction costs paid in connection with securities transactions during the year ended December 31, 2023 amounted to \$263,653 (December 31, 2022 - to \$119,131). Included in this amount is \$87,610 (December 31, 2022 - \$41,147) in brokerage commissions that were paid to MCC. All brokerage commissions paid by the Fund to MCC were at or below market rates. Brokerage commissions and other transaction costs are expensed and recorded in the Statements of Comprehensive Income.

C. Other Expenses

The Fund is responsible for the payment of all expenses relating to the operation of the Fund and the carrying on of its business, including among other things, audit, legal fees and expenses, custodian and transfer agency fees and costs relating to securityholder reporting. Certain services in the normal course of business may be provided by the Manager or an affiliate of the Manager in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 *Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds*. Examples of these services include the preparation and filing of tax returns, the preparation and filing of financial statements and related reports and maintaining and updating the Fund's website. In aggregate, these fees amounted to approximately \$110,672 throughout the year. Included in this amount is \$16,609 payable as at December 31, 2023. In addition, the Fund would be responsible for reimbursing the Manager for any reasonable out of pocket expenses incurred on the Fund's behalf. Common expenses incurred by the Fund are allocated among the series on a pro-rata basis among all shares of all series.

D. Distribution Receivable from Underlying Investments

As disclosed in the Schedule of Investment Portfolio, the Fund invests in investment funds managed by the Manager. Distributions receivable from the investment in these Funds, if any, would be included in the amount of Income and Interest Receivable shown on the Statements of Financial Position. As at December 31, 2023, distributions receivable from investments managed by the Manager amounted to \$49,250 (December 31, 2022 - \$49,250).

8. Securities Lending

The Fund had previously entered into a securities lending program with its custodian, RBC Investor Services Trust, in order to earn additional revenue. The Fund did not earn any securities lending income during the years ended December 31, 2023 or 2022.

On June 20, 2023, the Fund terminated its securities lending agreement with RBC Investor Services Trust and exited the program. There were no securities loaned or collateral held at the time of termination or as at December 31, 2022.

9. Capital Management

The Fund's capital is its Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Shares, representing shareholders' equity. The Fund's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for shareholders, maximize shareholder value and maintain financial strength.

The Fund is not subject to any externally imposed capital requirements. The Fund's overall strategy with respect to capital risk management remains unchanged from the year ended December 31, 2022.

10. Loss Carryforwards

At December 31, 2023, the Corporation had no non-capital losses (December 31, 2022 – \$nil) and no capital losses (December 31, 2022 – \$nil) available for carryforward for tax purposes.

11. Subsequent Events

On January 24, 2024, Discovery 2022 Short Duration LP transferred net assets to the Fund with a fair value amount of \$10.1 million in exchange for 0.6 million shares of the Fund. Under the Tax Act, the Fund is deemed to have acquired each flow-through asset of the partnership at an ACB equal to its cost amount to the partnership. The Tax Act deems the ACB of the assets that are flow-through shares to be \$nil.

On February 15, 2024, MRF 2022 Resource LP transferred net assets to the Fund with a fair value amount of \$10.7 million in exchange for 0.6 million shares of the Fund. Under the Tax Act, the Fund is deemed to have acquired each flow-through asset of the partnership at an ACB equal to its cost amount to the partnership. The Tax Act deems the ACB of the assets that are flow-through shares to be \$nil.

12. Distributions to Shareholders

Distributions to shareholders from the Fund are made to minimize income taxes payable by the Fund. Accordingly, distributions will vary from the accounting income reflected in these financial statements. Distributions of the Fund, unless otherwise specified by the shareholder, are automatically reinvested in additional shares of the Fund at the per share NAV without sales charge. Distributions per Series A share and Series F share of \$0.90 (December 31, 2022 – \$0.90) were paid to shareholders of the Fund during the year ended December 31, 2023.
